### SUMMER ROAD TRIPS AND YOUR CHILD'S SAFETY

(Burnaby, BC) – The BCAA Traffic Safety Foundation is reminding parents to make sure that your child is buckled up safely when you head out on the road this summer.

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The current regulations in BC require the use of child safety seats only for children up to 18 kg (40 lb.). Most children reach this weight by the time they are four or five years old, which is too young to safely use adult seat belts alone.

Children who have outgrown their forward-facing child seat should use a booster until they are 9 years of age unless they have reached the height of 145cm (4' 9") tall. Seat belts are designed to fit adults. A booster seat will correctly position the vehicle seat belt over your child’s shoulders and across the hips. Children under 9 who are using a seat belt without an appropriate booster seat face increased risk of serious injury and/or death in the event of a crash.

The current BC regulations also exempt non-parent drivers from child safety seat requirements, resulting in many children being transported without a child safety seat. Several of these exemptions will be removed by the new legislation announced by the government last May.

Before driving away for a fun filled family holiday, or just across town, make sure that everyone is buckled up in age appropriate passenger restraints and that child safety seats and booster seats are properly installed and used correctly. A few simple adjustments can ensure that your child is as safe as possible in a vehicle.

Follow these four simple rules to help you ensure your child’s safety:

- Make sure your infant or child is restrained on every trip — even short ones.
- Put your child in the back seat — in most cases, that’s the safest position in the vehicle.
- Use the appropriate child safety seat for your young one’s age, weight and size.
- Ensure that you install and use the child safety seat correctly.

The use of proper child restraints can reduce the risk of injury and death by up to 85 percent.
